Trees, Forests and Woodlands: Benefits

Targets

Scottish Government: Expand woodland cover by 100,000ha by 2022 Cairngorms Nature Action Plan seeks to create around 1000ha per year

Why plant trees?

Planting trees can provide a range of benefits including:

- Timber and Fuel,
- Shelter,
- Carbon Sequestration,
- Increased Habitat,
- Shading Watercourses,
- Aid Soil Stability,
- Help Limit Diffuse Pollution,
- Improve Natural Flood Management,
- Increase Land Values,
- Improve Landscape and Amenity.





Forestry Grant Scheme

Scotland's woodlands and forests are a vital national resource and play an important role in rural development and sustainable land use.

As well as helping to reduce the impacts of climate change and providing timber for industry, our forests enhance and protect the environment and provide opportunities for public enjoyment.

The Forestry Grant Scheme (FGS) will support:

- the creation of new woodlands contributing towards the Scottish Government target of 10,000 hectares of new woodlands per year
- · the sustainable management of existing woodlands

You can apply for support under eight categories:


- · two for the creation of woodland

Rural Payments and Services

Grant Support

Nine woodland creation options.

- Initial planting payment
- Annual maintenance payment for five years.
- Range of capital grants available for operations such as fencing and tree protection.

Basic Payment Scheme

- Afforested land will continue to be eligible for the Basic Payment Scheme
- 20 years duration of the woodland creation contract

CNP Priority Woodland Expansion Area


Cairngorms National Park Priority Areas for Woodland Expansion

Must be within the area identified by the Cairngorms National Park Authority

Aim: Encouraging Woodland Network Expansion

Higher payment rates (12.5%) for the following woodland creation options:

- Diverse Conifer (predominantly Scots pine)
- Native Scots Pine
- Native Upland Birch
- Native Broadleaves
- Native Low-density Broadleaves

- If required seek support from a forestry agent to apply to FGS and implement the project.


